

HEBREWS AND THE CATHOLIC EPISTLES

Course Description

This course studies the letter to the Hebrews and four Scriptural writings known as Catholic Epistles: James, 1st and 2nd Peter, and Jude.

Hebrews might have had a rough process of admission into the NT canon, but it is replete with irresistible qualities. Obviously, it sounds peculiar and singular. This letter to the Hebrews reflects the sublime depth and magnificent beauty of God's word both in its lexical and syntactic content, as well as in its semantic and rhetorical manifestations. Furthermore, and finally, we can observe its theological density and priestly Christological tone.

Consequently, with great curiosity and abundance of imagination, we wish to engage in a conscientious study of this canonical document among Sacred Scriptures.

On the Catholic Epistles, we shall examine them also, according to dating, authorship, style and theology.

We expect the students to acquire some knowledge and deeper understanding of the theological issues addressed by the letter to the Hebrews and each of the Catholic Epistles. They should comprehend the interconnections among the Catholic Epistles.
